*** PLANT NOW! ***

Northern Red Oak Tree Seedling

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Bur Oak Info: Fast growing- adding 24" per year, red fall color, 75'-90' high X 50'-75' wide, rounded shape, prefers full sun. Very hearty, tolerating pollution and compacted soils well, resistant to disease and pests. Medium sized acorns are popular with wildlife. Can live 400yrs. **When to plant:** ASAP, Fall/Winter? YES!!! This allows plenty of time for the seedling to establish a good root system before spring leaf-out. **Planting Instructions:** Remove the grass, Loosen the soil, Plant seedling, Water generously to settle soil. Mulch but leave open around trunk. **Future Care:** Water well for the first few summers (see back). Mulch every year - **never** <u>ever</u> weed-eat. Protect from deer with wire cage while small, then with trunk protectors when it gets 5'-6' tall. Avoid using lawn chemicals, they are harmful to both trees and the environment.

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Frequency of watering: Water the seedling regularly for the first few summers after planting. Water as needed thereafter. **Proper Watering Technique:** Lay garden hose at the base of the tree. Adjust water flow to slow trickle. Make sure water actually gets beneath the mulch. Leave the hose in place for 30-60 min. This allows the water to soak deep into the soil, encouraging the roots to grow downward, deep into the soil. A tree with a shallow root system will not survive future dry spells. Note: Mulch is good at holding moisture in the soil but it also prevents water from penetrating - be sure to water if rainfall has been light or even moderate. **Mulch:** Mulch yearly with light colored mulch. Light mulch won't absorb as much heat from the sun, keeps moisture in the soil better. **Weeding:** Never ever weed-eat - the thin cambium layer under the bark is easily damaged. Mulch well & hand weeding will be easy. **Deer:** Protect seedling/tree until trunk is at least 4"dia. Deer eat buds/leaves, bucks rub young tree trunks which can kill a young tree. **Trees:** Beautify communities, raise property values, clean the air, produce oxygen, reduce summer temps, soften urban streetscapes.

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
